

DAZZLING! opens at the Ohio Glass Museum Mottice/Cavins donate portion of Steuben Glass collection

On Thursday, September 12, the Ohio Glass Museum held the opening for their newest DAZZLING!... exhibition, brilliant collection of glass candleholders. The exhibition will remain open until August 30, 2025.

In a nearly 50-year adventure, Roger Bridgewater and Albert Schon, of St. Louis Missouri, amassed a treasure trove of more than 583 glass candleholders.

After decades of collecting, the couple decided it was time to downsize and they began searching for the perfect home for their collection.

"This collection began in 1977 with a pair of New Martinsville 'Man in the Moon' candlesticks. Because we collected American glass from a wide variety of manufacturers, we realized that we probably needed to explore museums that did not specialize in a particular manufacturer like Heisey or Fostoria," Schon said. "An internet search found the Ohio Glass Museum which seemed a particularly appropriate organization since so much of our

collection was made in the Ohio Valley glass houses."

The Ohio Glass Museum has the privilege of being the repository of innumerable singular pieces of beautiful glass (many on rotation, and featured in various showcases throughout museum) as well as a number of major collections of glass.

Some of the glass has been donated by the owners, some by their heirs. We are always delighted to receive the gifts and take the recording of such gift as a responsibility. For over 15 years, our Archivist, Pattie Frohnapfel, and her small crew, have painstakingly evaluated and entered each piece into our computer program. The process involves getting the history of the owner/donor, photographing, measuring, weighing, researching to discover the manufacturer, years produced, conditions of each piece and, if possible, individual designer and patent.

To accompany our amazing DAZZLING exhibition, we are featuring exhibits from our donated various collections.

Along with the names of the donors, you will find parts of collections from some of our local manufacturers, Anchor Hocking, Lancaster Glass, and Erickson, as well as many other Ohio River Valley companies.

Also explore our newest gift to the museum, The Mottice/Cavins Steuben Glass Collection. Larry and Kathleen Mottice have donated a portion of their Steuben Glass collection to the Ohio Glass Museum. Their good friends, Donna and Skip Cavins, donated the Steuben Peacock to round out the collection.

"The individual Steuben pieces were sales awards given each year at our National Sales meeting with each piece representing a certain level of sales. I retired from Baxter in 1991. I am very proud and thankful for the challenge and opportunity the company gave me." Larry Mottice.

Steuben was founded in 1903 by renowned English glass master Frederick Carder in New York. In 1918, Steuben became part of Corning Glass Works.



Also present were Fiscal Officer Susan Ramsey, Zoning Administrator Bill Simpson, Sherry Pymer, Misty Hoover Connor and Tracy Schrader. Mayor Gary Matheny left for a family emergency and Vincent B. Popo arrived at 7:30

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was said.

Roll call was taken and everyone was present.

A motion to accept the Tuesday August 13, 2024, council minutes was made by Councilor Stephanie Helle and seconded by Councilor Elizabeth Butler. Acting Mayor Dustin Bidwell abstained and the motion carried 5-0.

NEW BUSINESS:

Police Department: Chief Mark Consolo sent statistics for the month of August. department issued (3) three traffic warning, (0) zero traffic citation, (7) seven dispatch runs and (0) zero mutual aid runs and worked (112) One Hundred Twelve hours. The police requested to purchase a used cruiser for \$37,458.00 to be used as a backup vehicle. Council was in full agreement to purchase the vehicle.

Fire Department: Chief Robert Price sent the run totals for the month of August. Station 631 made (66) sixty-six runs; Station 632 made (15) fifteen runs; Station 633 made (34) thirty-four runs; and Walnut Township made

Sherry Pymer and Misty Hoover Connor presented council with more information concerning Industrial Solar Power projects leases in Walnut Township. Questions dealing with the effects upon the soil quality, infiltration of potential aquifers and feed for animal and human consumption have not been answered in any detail as well as disposal sites of damaged and obsolete panels. 



Collecting and Saving Milkweed Seed Pods Helps Monarchs

The Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative is a partnership of organizations working together to conserve Ohio's pollinators through raising awareness & the creation and improvement of pollinator habitat.

OPHI has partnered with Ohio's Soil & Water Conservation Districts to collect Common Milkweed (Asclepias syriaca) seed as it is vital to one of our most well know pollinators, the monarch butterfly. Monarchs rely on this plant for egg laying and caterpillar growth. Once they've emerged from the chrysalis, they migrate to Mexico for the winter and the cycle begins again.

To collect the seed pods from a milkweed plant it is best to pick them when they are dry, gray, or brown in color. If the center seam pops with gentle pressure, they can be picked. Use gloves while doing so. It is best to collect pods into paper bags or paper grocery sacks. Avoid using plastic bags because they attract moisture.

Please mark on the sack: the county in which the milkweed came from, date/time and if other than common milkweed; which species of milkweed collected.

Leave a few pods on the plant encourage natural regeneration. Harvesting other pods from milkweed plants does not have any effect on the population of milkweed in established areas.

All milkweed pods collected during this time will be processed by OPHI partners and the seed collected will be used to establish plantings and create additional habitat throughout

Drop off collected milkweed pods in the labeled collection bin Agriculture Center located at 831

43130. The drop-off bin will be available October 1 – October 31. For details contact Lauren Vires at Fairfield SWCD.




