## Fall fire safety

Now that it is November and the cold weather is setting in, the Lancaster Fire Department would like to remind the community of some important fire safety issues.

If you have leaves you have raked or brush from our recent storms, put the leaves and brush in lawncare bags. Set them out with your trash, instead of trying to burn them yourselves. Burning leaves and brush can cause air pollution and can be harmful to people with respiratory issues. Burning leaves and brush can also start wildfires, especially in dry conditions like we have recently seen in Fairfield County. For those who like to use fire pits this time of year, make sure you call the fire department when you start a fire and when it is extinguished. You don't need to get permission to use a fire pit, it just gives the fire department a heads up, in case the fire would get out of control and you would need their services. Use dry seasoned firewood in your fire pit, instead of brush and trash. Also, make sure you have a bucket of water or a hose nearby, in case the fire would get out of control. Fire left unattended can spread rapidly.

many people like to use auxiliary devices to heat their home. This can be a great way to stay warm, but it can also be dangerous. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission shares that home heating and cooling equipment is a top cause of fire deaths and they suggest the following:

1. Have a three-foot area around the heater, so pets and children aren't able to get burned

meeting place outside the home. Help your children practice going outside to the meeting place, and teach them that they should never do back into a house that is on fire.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and other fire safety experts, families with a practiced fire escape plan in place are significantly more likely to survive a house fire compared to those without one. Studies show that having a plan and practicing it regularly can drastically reduce the risk of death in a home fire, with some estimates suggesting a potential life-saving rate of up to 50% or more when compared to families without a plan. Slade Schultz, Assistant Fire Chief of the Lancaster Fire Department, shares, "It only takes a momentary lapse in judgement that can create a life altering event." 2. Have heaters cleaned and inspected annuallv bv а professional

3. Install carbon monoxide detectors in your home. The batteries should be changed each year the same time you change the batteries in your fire alarm.

When you change the batteries in your carbon monoxide detector and fire alarm, you should also sit your family down and review what they should do in case of a fire. Children should be reminded to get low and crawl out of the house. The U.S. Fire Administration suggests that parents make a fire escape plan. In your plan, talk about who will help each child get out safely. Village Council met on Tuesday October 8, 2024, at 7:00 PM in the Municipal Building. In attendance were Council Members President Pro Tem Dustin Bidwell, Elizabeth Butler, Nicole Crossan, Stephanie Helle, Rick Thompson and Jim McKittrick. Also present were Fiscal Officer Susan Ramsey, Zoning Administrator Bill Simpson, Assistant Village Administrator Tim Morris and residents Sherry Pymer, Misty Hoover Connor, Barb Martin, Frank Martin, Betty Bennett, George Bennett and Branston Schilling. Village Administrator Vincent B. Popo was absent.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was said. Roll call was taken and everyone was present.

A motion to accept the Tuesday September 10, 2024 council minutes was made by Councilor Rick Thompson and seconded by Councilor Stephanie Helle. All voted yes and the motion carried 6-0. A motion to pay the bills was made by Councilor Elizabeth Butler and seconded by Councilor Dustin Bidwell. All voted yes and the motion carried 6-0.

The Village of Millersport has a General Fund renewal levy that is important to funding the general fund expenses.

<u>NEW BUSINESS:</u> Police Department

Police Department: Chief Mark Consolo sent statistics for the month of September. The department issued (11) eleven traffic warning, (1) one traffic citation, (4) four dispatch runs and (0) zero mutual aid runs and worked (142) One Hundred Forty-two hours. Councilor Rick Thompson and Councilor Beth Butler requested that Chief Mark Consolo attend more council meetings and that the police reports be more detailed and include officer activity outside of Millersport proper. The Safety Committee needs to set a date to discuss new officer candidates.

**Fire Department**: Chief Robert Price sent the run totals for the month of September. Station 631 made (42) forty-two runs; Station 632 made (28) twentyeight runs; Station 633 made (23) twenty-three runs; and Walnut Township made (31) thirty-one mutual aid runs.

Sherry Pymer and Misty Hoover Connor presented council with more information concerning Industrial Solar Power projects leases in Walnut Township. Questions dealing with the effects upon the soil quality, infiltration of potential aquifers and feed for animal and human consumption have not been answered in any detail as well as disposal sites of damaged and obsolete panels. A sample letter was given to all council members, police chief and the mayor.

The village is exploring the creation of a museum in the American Legion building. Vince will contact J-me Braig at the Buckeye Lake Museum to see how they fund their operation. The public seems to be receptive to the idea.

The ordinance for short term rentals and the Air B&B is being presented for final discussion before we send it back to the solicitor for the ordinance's final document. A checklist supplemental will be added to the final document.

Tim and Gary presented council with information of the Community Economic Development Agreement. After much discussion council requested that Commissioner Jeff Fix and Rick Ricketts present their thoughts. Both of them will be invited to the November meeting.

**RESOLUTION 1388** is a resolution recommending wage increases for 2025. This is the 1st Reading.

The American Legion building has a new roof and siding. The next phase is to redo the plumbing and upgrade the restroom facilities. Zoning Administrator Bill Simpson will oversee the upgrade and Matt Clark will be doing the plumbing work for the village.

The Village of Millersport will

be celebrating its Bicentennial in 2025. Plans are now being set to form committees to plan the celebration. Residents that are interested in being part of this event should contact Vince Popo (614-562-7320). Plans are for a Bi-centennial Festival Day was set by council on Saturday July 5, 2025 with food trucks, bounce houses, games including a dunk tank. Jim Johnson is to coordinate a car show for the day. Contacts from the Sweet Corn Lions Club include Steve Shover (Vice Chair for Facilities), Diana Keller (President of the Millersport Lions Club), Tamarra Parker-Stephens (Sweet Corn Festival Heritage Chair), Dan Booze (Sweet Corn Festival Assistant Marketing Chair), and Lindsay Drumm (Sweet Corn Festival Major Prize Chair).

The village received a grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to design and engineer the canal seawall and refurbish the canal bank and sidewalk. An open house hosted by EMHT (Engineers, Surveyors, Planners and Scientists) at the American Legion was held on Tuesday September 17, 2024 from 5:30 to 7:00. There was a good turnout and many questions were answered.

A motion to adjourn was made by Councilor Elizabeth Butler and seconded by Councilor Dustin Bidwell. All voted yes and the motion carried 6-0.

Sharon met the four volunteers at the door of her father's hospital room one April afternoon. Her father, Len, was in one of the Palliative Care rooms of the hospital. The volunteers had been requested to honor her father, a veteran, for his military service with a brief military pinning ceremony.

While in the hall outside of her father's room, Sharon told one of the volunteers that the room was packed and that there wasn't any more space for even one person to stand in his room. She said if they'd wait for a minute she'd ask a few people to stand in the hall and watch the ceremony from there.

Soon, with a little bit of confusion and a lot of, "Pardon me", "Excuse me.", "I'm sorry." and one "Oops", the four volunteers threaded their way through the crowd of family members to get near Len's bedside and begin the ceremony. Even though Len was in a deep sleep the facilitator introduced himself and explained what he and his cohorts were going to do.

Before beginning, the facilitator asked if any of the family members would want to perform the actual fastening of the pins to Len's garment. This is a significant gesture because when someone enlists, the family is left behind and most likely experiences separation anxiety. And the same is most likely experienced by the one who enlisted. By fastening the pins to the garment the family experiences the joy of honoring their loved one just as the loved is experiencing the joy of being honored.

Len's grandson, Chris, serving in the Air Force at Grand Forks Air Force Base, had flown in to be able to witness the ceremony honoring his grandpa. Sharon said Chris idolized his grandpa and always said when he grew up he was going to enlist in the Air Force.

The family insisted that his grandson, Chris, should be given the honor.

The ceremony began and soon it was time for Chris to fasten the pins. He crouched down at his grandpa's bedside so that he was eye to eye with his hero and carefully fastened the American Flag pin to his garment above the heart. Then the Branch of Service pin was fastened below the flag. After he finished, he hesitated then put his head down on his grandpa's chest and softly said, "I love you, Grandpa." He stood up and took a half step back. Visibly holding back tears he stood at attention. There was a stillness, a deep sense

of oneness prevailed in the room for those few moments.

The ceremony continued as one of the volunteers read the certificate and presented it to Len's wife. The volunteers then individually crouched down to be at eye level to Len and thanked him for his sacrifice to our country.

Five family members in Len's family were veterans. The facilitator asked if the veterans present would want to join our volunteers in saluting their dad/grandpa/brother to conclude the ceremony. All agreed. They unanimously voted Chris to command the salute since he was active duty.

All of the veterans formed around the foot of Len's bed. Chris stared at his grandpa, took a deep breath and barked, "A-ten-shun!" The men snapped to attention.

"Present Arms!"



The salute concluded the ceremony.

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

After a process that included more than 70 submissions, a name was selected that ties together all of the aspects of the local transit system: The Link.


"The Link is a name that perfectly reflects what our transit system does," said Fairfield County Commissioner Steve
