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



Located on FMC's Main Campus, the Care Closet contains clothing and other items that are available free of charge for patients and visitors in need of clothing to wear home from the hospital or other care items to make their stay more comfortable. John Yorde, a member of the Buckeye Lake Eagles, said he approached the officers about donating money to the Care Closet following his recent hospitalization at Fairfield Medical Center. The Village of Millersport had a General Fund renewal levy that passed and the mayor and council thanked the community for their support.

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
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### Kiwanis - All You Can Eat Pancake Festival!



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### **OSU Extension Update**

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### **Holiday Leftover Safety**

All good things must come to an end, including the holidays. But leftovers from your holiday celebrations can help stretch out your holiday cheer.

When the party is over and you're cleaning up, it's important to assess the safety of the foods that are leftover. If perishable foods (meat, poultry, cooked foods, cheese, cut up fruits and vegetables) were out for more than two hours, they should be discarded. If you kept hot foods hot (above 140°F), with chafing dishes, warming trays or slow cookers you will want to refrigerate any leftovers right away. Perishable foods that were not out for more than two hours, or that were kept on ice also can be saved. Prompt storage can prevent pathogenic bacteria that cause foodborne illness from growing in your leftovers. These bacteria have no odor and can't be tasted or seen.

Leftovers should be stored in shallow pans or containers so that they cool down quickly. The quicker your leftovers cool, the less time they spend in the "Danger Zone" (40–140°F). Most leftovers will keep for about four days in your refrigerator.

As you are putting food away, ask yourself if you can finish the leftovers in 4 days. If not, go ahead and package them for the freezer. Most cooked foods will keep their best quality for 2-4 months in the freezer. To protect your foods from the drying effects of the freezer, package them in heavy duty plastic containers, freezer bags, aluminum foil or freezer pa-

poultry and other foods.

# End of Season ....CLEANING YOUR GARDENING TOOLS

Step 1- Clean your tools with a stiff bristle brush, wire brush, paint scraper, or blast of water to remove dirt and debris. Use steel wool to remove rust and sap. Or put a few drops of oil on a cotton rag and rub sap from tools and blades. Lightly sand wooden handles with a medium grit sandpaper to eliminate splinters. Wash tools with warm, soapy water and let them air dry. If it's a sunny day, use the sunshine to dry your tools!

Step 2 – Disinfect tools with 70% alcohol (best for sharp blades) or a 10% bleach solution. Avoid routinely using bleach wipes because the bleach will corrode metal.

Step 3 – Sharpen your tools. You can get them professionally sharpened or do it yourself. For digging tools like spades, shovels, or hoes, use a whetstone and/or a file and follow the angle of the existing edge. Move in ONE direction only. For cutting tools like shears, pruners, or loppers use a whetstone or file/handheld sharpener. Follow the angle or edge of the blade; move in ONE direction across the entire blade. Check the backside of the blade for burrs and remove them using the same pro-

Step 4 – Lightly oil metal surfaces with a lubricant such as WD-40 and protect wooden handles with linseed oil.

Step 5 – Store tools indoors and off the ground where they could be exposed to moisture. Disconnect, drain, and store all hoses before a hard freeze.

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### Funding for local cleanup project

COLUMBUS - State Senator Tim Schaffer (R-Lancaster) announced the Ohio Controlling Board approved \$4.5 million for an environmental remediation project in Pataskala.

"These funds will help continue the work to clean up this site and ensure we protect our community," Schaffer said. "Hopefully these additional dollars will keep this cleanup moving forward and preserve the health of the people of Pataskala."

The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is currently remediating infiltration ponds at the Matlack, Inc. site. The company used the location for tanker washing from 1954 to 1989. These tanker trucks carried liquid chemicals and industrial wastes, and the wastewater from this work was released into the infiltration ponds until 1980.

The EPA is currently cleaning up these ponds. During this process, an additional 4,200 tons of hazardous soil was discovered, necessitating additional funds to properly dispose of and incinerate the hazardous materials.

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### FFA surfs to States in Aquarium & Animal Management Contestants hope for success in new waters

The Aquarium Management Team competed at the Ohio FFA Center on November 11, 2024. the Aquarium Management team placed 7th out of 100 in the state for 2024. Since they were in the top 10, they will receive a plaque for the Lancaster chapter. When preliminary online exam scores came back, the team placed 9th in the state. They moved up two ranking spots to 7th, and Addyson Brown placed 8th in Individuals for the entire state!

After the competition, the state-qualifying Animal Management team for the Lancaster FFA chapter came in 7th in the state. They originally placed 5th when the exam results came out with one of Lancaster's own, Faith Staffey, being in the top 3. This contest is new to the Lancaster FFA Advisor Brandon Thomas, and it was an amazing experience for Lancaster to rank so well.

I first wanted to talk with our highest-placing contestants in each competition. I spoke with Addyson Brown, who placed 8th in the state for Aquarium Management CDE, about how she felt about the study process and competition. "Each of us going to the competition made a slideshow of all of the species we needed to memorize," she said. " I studied by looking at all of those and watching videos for each of the practicums," Brown said.

Faith Staffey who placed 12th in the state for the Animal Management CDE explained what her studying process was like and some things she learned for future reference. "I expected to place low. I felt bad after taking the exam and was shocked when I placed 3rd. When I realized that I

had a chance, I studied as much as I could using all the resources available to me. I also tried to help my team however I could, like taking extra research material for others to study later," she explained. "When I was at the competition I was going through everything I read and researched in my head. That way I was able to answer things fast when I needed to. From there I just tried the best I could." Staffey said.

I reached out to one of our juniors who is a first-year FFA member who competed in Aquarium Management; Hailey Rings. Rings, being a junior, the state placed 51st in competition. When questioned about her first experience with Aquarium Management, she said, When I was at the competition I was going through everything I read and researched in my head. That way I was able to answer things fast when I needed to. From there I just tried the best I could, trying to memorize all the different ID's of fish, equipment, fish food, and plants. It was difficult to try and learn them but I studied very hard and got them down. Another thing that was difficult in the competition was the different practicums because I wasn't sure what to expect when I went behind the curtains so I didn't know exactly what to study for. But I learned a lot of different things like siphoning water out of a tank, how to change a filter, what food to feed fish, and how to test water. So learning all these things helped me better myself in the competition and helped me place well in it!" she said.

Brandon Thomas is the new Lancaster FFA chapter advisor. I contacted him for an interview about his thought process and the materials he prepared his students with. " I used my previous

experience with online tests to determine that students would need to study the different chapters from the book and make study guides for each chapter. My goal always to get students to place as high as possible in the state for tests as that gives you an advantage going into the inperson portion of the contest. Once the test came back and we qualified for the in-person contest, I decided to use the student's background knowledge advantage and have them create resources for each practicum. I held a meeting with each team to assign individual students to develop the resources." Thomas explained.

This was Thomas's first time competing in Aquarium and Animal Management, so I was wondering what his expectations were for his students competing in this CDE. Thomas continued, "As an advisor, you always have high hopes for your students to do well. The students that I had on the team I knew were going to work hard to do the best they could. These contests were new to me so it was difficult to prepare kids for what I didn't know. Now knowing what these contests are, I will be able to better prepare students in

the future years.' After the rankings came back and seeing how Lancaster placed I was curious as to what Thomas was thinking at this time. Also, I wondered how this compared to the hardest challenge I faced was his experience last year. " No matter what scores come back, I am always happy with the students who go above and beyond a traditional FFA member and compete in a CDE. I was extremely proud of the students getting 7th in the state as it was most of the first contests they ever competed in. I was little disappointed that we were so close to earning a banner for being top 5. Next year, I will start preparing the students earlier and try to keep the same students together so that they can improve their previous year's scores. I will try to bring in experts to help practice the different skills associated with each contest."

Lancaster had a great turnout for these contests for the chapter. They cannot wait to compete again next year.

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
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
