

### Baltimore's founding to be marked with events in 2025

Baltimore residents will soon be celebrating their village's founding 200 years ago with a number of events in 2025, including Baltimore history lectures and walking tours, a Heritage Tour featuring select Baltimore homes, an old fashioned ice cream social, and dedication of the new Bicentennial Park.

"It's going to be both educational and fun," said Debbie Schaffner, chair of the Bicentennial Planning Committee. "It will also be rich in history, because the story of

Baltimore and Basil is so fascinating that many current residents still talk about it".

In the early 1800s, Baltimore was divided into rivaling "twin cities", consisting of the Swisssettled village of Basil (a misspelling of Basel, Switzerland) and the Virginiansettled village of Baltimore (originally New Market). The two cities merged after WWII and was almost named "Baseball" but ultimately Baltimore was deemed the official name of the united villages.

Schaffner said the celebration will officially kick off on March 2 at noon with the ringing of 200 church bells and an open house at the Victoria Opera House. The Baltimore Museum will also be open to the public. Bicentennial 2025 calendars are currently on sale at the village office, featuring vintage photos of both Baltimore and Basil, along with brief descriptions of the photos. In addition, the village is also selling Legacy Bricks so that past and current residents can honor their ancestors or their current families, businesses and/or organizations.



# Everyone smiles for a cookie

The Smile Cookie Fundraiser has been a big hit in Canada in the last several years, but this is the first year Tim Hortons has brought it to the United States.

According to Vanco Education, an organization that supports K-12 schools and community education, a lack of social skills can lead to poor outcomes in child development. It can hinder a child's ability to create relationships, affect their adjustment at school, lead to loneliness, and cause behavioral problems in the future. This is why it is important to instill social skills in children early on in life.

The American Psychological Association explains that building resilience is the ability to adapt well to adversity, trauma, tragedy, threats, or significant sources of stress. It can help our children manage stress, and feelings of anxiety and uncertainty. The National Association for the Education of Young Children adds that resilient students understand that changes and bring challenges can They opportunities. view mistakes as a chance to learn, accepting that failing often succeeding, precedes and recognizing that effort develops knowledge and skill.

Kids from our local YMCA are chosen to spend time at these camps during the summer months learning social skills and how to be more resilient. Some kids even go back for future visits and go on to become camp leaders and mentors. Over the last 50 years,



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



(LANCASTER, OH) - The Lancaster Fairfield County Chamber of Commerce proudly announces the launch of the 2025 National Civics Bee®, an initiative aimed at encouraging more young Americans to engage in civics and contribute to their communities. Hosted in partnership with The Civic Trust<sup>®</sup> of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation, the competition will inspire middle schoolers to become better American informed about democracy. to engage respectfully and constructively in the community, and to build greater trust in others and institutions.

Middle school students in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade from public, private, charter, and home schools are invited to take part in the firstround civics essay competition. After a distinguished panel of judges review the essays, the top 20 students will be selected to

advance to their local competition: an in-person live event featuring two rounds of civics questions followed by a Q&A round to test their civics knowledge. The Lancaster Fairfield County Chamber of Commerce will host its local competition on Wednesday, April 9, 2025. The local finalists and top winners will receive various prizes, including prizes worth at least \$500 for the first-place student.

Participants in the National Civics Bee® will have the chance to gain recognition for their civics knowledge and skills and compete for prestigious prizes throughout the competition. The competition enables students to explore issues that matter to their communities, furthering their understanding of civic and fostering engagement responsible citizenship. Winners from each of the local competitions across Ohio will be invited to take part in the state finals. The first-place winner of the state finals will receive a trip to Washington, D.C. to compete for prizes worth at least \$50,000 during the national championship in the Fall of 2025.

Using this technology, doctors are able to diagnose and treat

### Real estate tax relief for seniors and 100% disabled veterans available through county auditor



Ohio Lancaster. Homeowners aged 65 and older or those who are permanently and totally disabled may qualify Ohio's Homestead for Exemption for property tax relief.

That relief is improved due to legislation passed in 2023. Homestead The income threshold and exemption amounts now adjust with inflation annually.

Auditor Carri County Brown, stated, "The Homestead Exemption program is an important program for Ohio. I am encouraged for how the Homestead program, please state legislators have expanded exempted amount. They are supporting relief for seniors and disabled veterans with their at: actions to improve the program."

will adjust to \$40,000 for 2025, up from \$38,600 in 2024.

The exemption amount, which reduces the amount of the value of the property that is taxed, will increase to \$28,000 in 2025, up from \$26,200 in 2024.

Those currently on the program will automatically see increased exemption the amount.

Disabled veterans with a 100% disability rating and their surviving spouses qualify for an enhanced exemption. This amount also adjusts annually for inflation. The enhanced exemption value will increase from \$52,300 in 2024 to \$56,000 in 2025.

These amounts above apply to tax year 2024 (collected in calendar year 2025) for real property and to tax year 2025 (collected in calendar year 2025) for manufactured or mobile homes.

The Foundation began hosting their annual "Give" events in 2014 organization's 25th Anniversary. Over the years, the event has been community, with donations



LANCASTER, OH — Fairfield County Commissioner Dave Levacy was inducted into the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame the Army in 1965 while a student recently at The Ohio State at Ohio University and served University's Fawcett Center in until November 1967. The U.S. Army veteran is one of 20 inductees this year, including Fairfield County Air Force veteran Michael W. Carrell. After his military service, Levacy was the Millersport/Walnut Township Fire Department chief and also worked as a paramedic. Applicants will receive an email with any issues by March 1, 2025, so that any problems can be corrected before the final deadline on Friday, March 7, 2025. Applicants can be graduating high school seniors, current undergraduate, graduate, non-traditional or vocation/technical school students.


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
