

September is Sepsis Awareness Month



Sepsis is the body's extreme reaction to an infection that affects approximately 1.7 million Americans a year. Lancaster residents John Sharp and his son, Jay Sharp, are both a part of that statistic. In 2022, Jay was hospitalized at Fairfield Medical Center with sepsis after contracting pnemonia. Two years later, John was also hospitalized after a kidney stone ruptured his kidney, causing sepsis. In both instances, John and Jay were quick to seek medical attention when they started to experience pain and shaking that quickly turned severe.

"For me, only two to three hours had passed between the time I started to feel unwell to my arrival at the hospital," recalled Jay. "It escalated that quickly."

Livestock producers in Fairfield/ Perry County are eligible for drought recovery assistance

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Kylene Newman in Fairfield/ Perry County recently announced that FSA is now accepting applications for the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) for grazing losses due to drought. The deadline to apply for 2024 LFP assistance is January 30, 2025.

LFP provides compensation to eligible livestock producers who suffered grazing losses for covered livestock due to drought on privately owned or cash leased land or fire on federally managed land. For LFP, qualifying drought intensity levels are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor. Producers in Fairfield Perry County are eligible to apply for 2024 LFP benefits for grazing losses on native pasture and improved pasture mixed forage. Visit the FSA LFP webpage for a full list of eligible counties and pasture types.

Livestock eligible for LFP include alpacas, beef cattle, bison, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, ostriches, reindeer, or sheep that have been or would have been grazing the eligible grazing land or pastureland. Recently, FSA updated LFP policy to expand program eligibility to include additional income producing grazing animals, like horses and ostrich, that contribute to the commercial viability of an agricultural operation.

Livestock used for hunting and consumption by the owner

As a reminder, producers who want to participate in many USDA programs including disaster assistance programs like LFP, must file timely acreage reports by filling out the FSA-578 form to remain eligible for program benefits. Livestock producers interested in applying LFP should contact Fairfield-Perry County FSA at 740-653-4012 with any questions about the eligibility of specific livestock and forage crops.

The Log Cabin on the Fairfield County Fairgrounds was moved to the fairgrounds in 1953. You ask, why was the log cabin moved? The year of 1953 was the 150th year of statehood for the State of Ohio. A number of people thought something needed to be done to celebrate the State of Ohio birthday. They came up with the idea to relocate a log cabin built in 1803 to the Fairfield County Fairgrounds.

The log cabin selected was located north of Lancaster, along the Lancaster-Thornville Road (188 Pleasantville Road) and was the property of Samuel "Sam" Wills Keister and his wife, Nellie Arabelle. According to the history written by Edna Keister Waites, Samuel's great, great grandfather, Joseph Bartoon, constructed the log cabin using the white oak trees, located on the property. Samuel was the 5th generation to live in the log cabin and his daughter, Edna Waites was the last generation born in the

The log cabin's exterior was changed in 1983 with the metal siding installed for preservation purposes. The next 38 years the

cabin faced an "identity crisis" because the logs were only visible when the cabin was open for visitors to enter the cabin. In the past years, knowledge and techniques to maintain, preserve and repair historic log buildings has evolved.

of the leaves... How does it happen?

A favorite fall pastime for many is to enjoy the changing color of the leaves. It is always a highlight of the upcoming Fairfield County Fair to view the spectacular leaf color as it transforms Mt. Pleasant into a palate of beautiful fall color. Fall is truly a time of year when people enjoy crisp cool weather and marvel at the transforming landscape as tree leaves turn from lush green to gorgeous shades of brown.

Weather factors such as temperature, precipitation and soil moisture influence fall color arrival, duration and vibrancy. According to United States National Arboretum, a wet growing season followed by a dry autumn filled with sunny days and cool, frostless nights results in the brightest palette of fall colors. Changes in weather can speed up, slow down or change the arrival time of fall's colorful foliage.

True colors come from inside. Trees actually begin to show their true colors in autumn, and here's why. The four primary pigments that produce color within a leaf chlorophyll (green); xanthophylls (yellow); carotenoids (orange); and anthocyanins (reds and purples). During the warmer growing



seasons, produce chlorophyll to help plants create energy from light. The green pigment becomes dominant and masks the other pigments. Trees must replenish the chlorophyll because sunlight causes it to fade over time. As days get shorter and nights become longer, trees prepare for winter and the next growing season by blocking off flow to and from a leaf's stem. This process stops from chlorophyll being replenished and causes the leaf's green color to fade. The fading green allows a leaf's true colors to emerge, producing the dazzling array of orange, yellow, red and purple pigments referred to as fall foliage. With cooler days ahead, make time to enjoy the beautiful fall colors.

Several Brown's descendants have been located and plan to attend the solemn but tribute to Brown, and conduct a colorful dedication. Descendants can contact SAR representative



I love the Fairfield County Fair. And it is not just the food that I like about it. I also really enjoy talking with all the people I seem to see once a year only at the Fair. There is also another reason the Fair is so important to me and that is the conversations I have with Fair attendees at FAIRHOPE's displays in both the WLOH tent and in the Art Hall. Conversations with fair visitors can be lively.

One of the things I've noticed is that anyone who approaches one of our displays and has had no experience with FAIRHOPE will take one of our pens, a piece of penny-candy, and maybe a wristband and keep on walking. However, the people who have had an experience with FAIRHOPE, either through a family member or an acquaintance, will usually have something to say. And it is always nice.

One evening a few years ago one of FAIRHOPE's volunteers was at our Art Hall booth when a woman came up to say thanks for our care of her dad. What got the volunteer's attention was the woman said that

Of course, for Roy to attend the Fair there would be obstacles that would challenge the staff of the facility and for Roy, as well. The biggest concern for the facility was if he could tolerate being up all day and in a regular wheelchair as opposed to the specialty wheelchair that he normally used. If he couldn't tolerate being up all day, there we would be a need to get him home sooner. Just in case, a backup plan was devised to have a nursing home employee, who was to accompany the group, drive her own van in order to bring Roy back if needed.

It is important to note that

It is important to note that FAIRHOPE allows staff to attend activities such as this but it doesn't commit to being involved in planning or funding any activities such as this. We allow the ill person and family do what they want. It is their life, and they are in charge.

His day was filled with watching the harness racing, eating Fair food, attempting to win a cane, walking through the Art Hall, seeing the newly born baby calves and other attractions. Even better, he saw a lot of faces of old friends and schoolmates. Roy had a contagious smile from ear to ear that lasted the entire day. As the day ended Roy said it best, "Good to be out there.

Something about the Fair makes the youth come out in me."

There is something about the Fairfield County Fair that keeps so many people coming back every year. Ask Ray's daughter; she knows that finally someone understands.

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
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admitted to our service, the intake social worker asked her dad what was important to him. That question, to me, is the hallmark of FAIRHOPE's care because even from the beginning, we don't focus on the illness; the illness has been addressed long enough. We focus on the person who is ill and all of the people affected by the illness to learn what is truly important to them.

In this instance, the woman's dad, "Roy", was a resident of a nursing home. He wanted more than anything to go to the approaching Fairfield County Fair. In Roy's case, going to the Fair seemed like wishful thinking since he had developed several ambulatory problems. What he had on his side, however, was a positive attitude, and a lot of compassionate people willing to work together to make his longing a reality.

Roy's "far off wish", as he called it, began to get wings when his FAIRHOPE nurse, "Laura", was visiting him one afternoon at the nursing home. He expressed his desire to go with the other residents of the facility on their scheduled outing to the fair but his physical condition seemingly prevented him from leaving the facility. As a FAIRHOPE nurse, when Laura heard that Roy's wish seemed impossible she replied, "I'll see what we can do."

In their conversation at the Fair, Roy's daughter told our volunteer she could not believe that a trip to the Fair was even being considered, but tearfully said she agreed to give it a try



You can "step back in time" as the county fair goes on and reminisce about the past.

The Mt. Zion Brethren in Christ Church was erected in 1858 by Daniel Huddle and others. It was moved and rebuilt, not that long ago, on the fairgrounds in 1990.

There is also the The Weakley, No 6, Liberty Township School House, built in 1870. It was moved and rebuilt on the fairgrounds in 1976. The original school house bell was presented by Douglas A. Weakley of Upper Arlington,

There are also two buildings, one called, the Pioneer Doctor's Office and the Baggage Room. Dr. John V. Brison and son Henry, had this building located in Millersport, built in the mid 1850's and was moved to the fairgrounds in 1985. From our speaking with the fair office secretary, we learned the Country Store was originally located in the small village, just down the road from Lancaster, called Dumontville. It was founded 134 years ago, in 1885, by Emanuel Miller and was later sold to Mr. Joe Arnold in 1904 and he operated the store until 1959. From 1959 to the time of its closing in 1964, the store was ran by Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Alvis. The building sat empty and in 1969, Mr. and Mrs. Alvis donated the store to the Fairfield County Agricultural Society and moved the store. I understand it contained a barbershop, a post office and later they added gas pumps.

Enjoy exploring the historic buildings on the fairgrounds and have a great time at the fair!









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

While the play will be performed for the general public on December 5, 6, 7 and 8, Aubrey said this student matinee is being offered at a reduced cost.


"Tickets for the 10:00 a.m. matinee are \$5 each with 1 chaperone admitted free for every 20 student tickets purchased,"said Aubrev.
